About 80% of people who use Heroin first misused prescription opioids.<sup>2</sup>

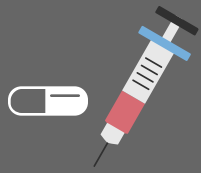

Overdose rates from prescription opioids were higher among non-Hispanic whites and American Indian or Alaskan Natives, compared to non-Hispanic blacks and Hispanics.<sup>2</sup>

Over 40% of people with a substance use disorder also have a mental health condition, yet fewer than half receive treatment for either disorder.<sup>5</sup>
