Core Elements of the DMC-ODS Pilot Program

- **Benefits:** Continuum of care modeled after nationally-recognized standard of care, American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM)
- **Accountability:** Increased local control and accountability
- **Beneficiary Protections:** Strong provisions for program integrity and beneficiary protections
- **Oversight:** Utilization tools to improve care and manage resources
- **Quality:** Evidence-based practices (EBPs)
- **Integration:** Coordination with other systems of care

DMC-ODS Impact



- 40 of CA's 58 counties have indicated they wish to participate, reaching >97% of CA's population
- 19 counties have been approved to start implementing services, reaching almost 77% of CA's population



O-STR and SOR Project Goals

- Increase statewide utilization of buprenorphine
- Save lives & foster recovery
- Address stigma and discrimination surrounding addiction
- Integrate addiction care into the greater health care system
- Development of innovative and sustainable practices, processes, and relationships



O-STR and SOR Funding

- Both grants funded by SAMHSA
- Opioid STR
 - \$90 Million for 2 Years
 - Grant period: 5/1/2018 – 4/30/2019
 - DHCS will apply for no cost extension for Year 3 (Spring 2019)
- State Opioid Response
 - \$138 Million for 2 Years
 - Grant period: 9/30/2018 – 9/29/2020

California Hub and Spoke System



- **\$78 million** allocated to CA H&SS treatment services
- **19 Hubs**
- **Over 150 Spokes** covering **36+ counties**. This includes 7 of the 10 counties with highest opioid overdose rates



UCLA Evaluation and LC

UCLA Evaluation

- Created the **data reporting structure** and collects CA H&SS data elements
- Conducting an **evaluation** of CA H&SS Project
- Coordinates with CDPH's Prescription Drug Overdose Prevention epidemiological team and data dashboard

UCLA Learning Collaboratives

- Oversees and implements the CA H&SS Learning Collaborative
- Conducts orientation, clinical trainings, and seminars for CA H&SS
- Coordinates with CSAM on training and mentoring projects
- Provides quarterly statewide MAT trainings for the public, stakeholders, and providers



Tribal MAT Project

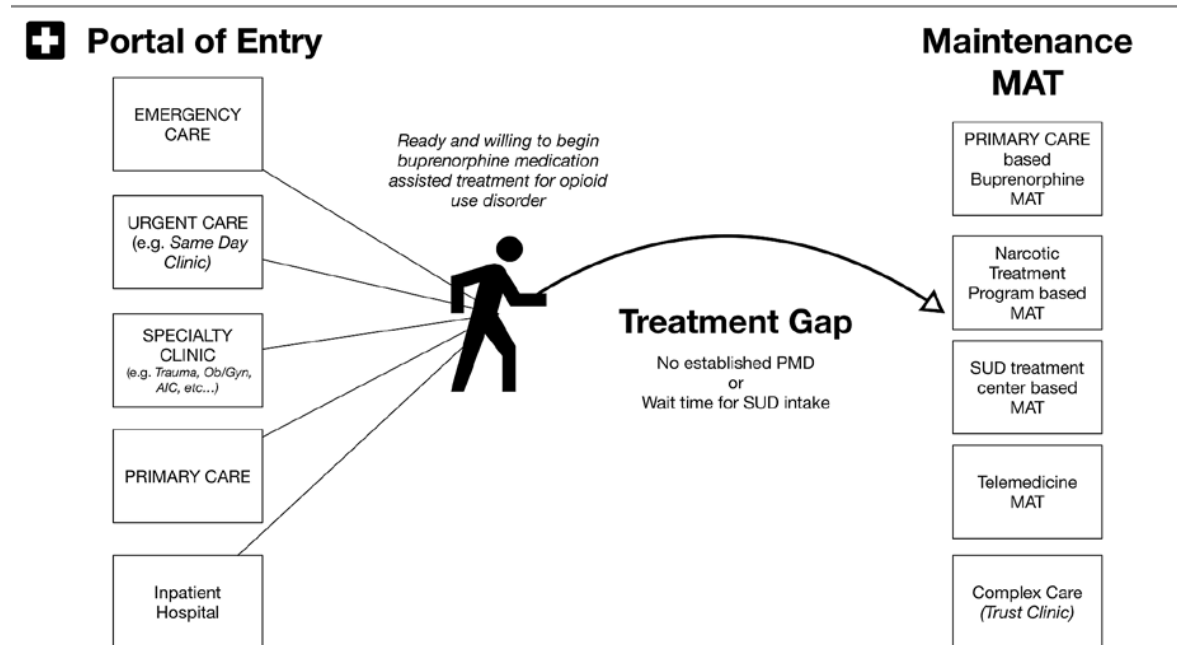
- Funding specific to American Indian and Alaskan Native Populations
 - Project Echo
 - Suicide Prevention
 - Naloxone Distribution to First Responders
 - Culturally Specific MAT Programs
 - Needs Assessment, Education, and Training



ED MAT Bridge Program

- Expand access to MAT for Californians suffering from OUD
- Provide implementation guidance, TA, and training to EDs
- Evaluate efficacy of ED-based interventions to increase MAT
- Disseminate evaluation results to guide future ED intervention efforts statewide and nationally

Expanding MAT in County Criminal Justice Settings

- Reduce morbidity and mortality for persons with opioid addiction who are involved with the criminal justice system by:
 - Building new capacity in California jails to maintain MAT prescribed in the community for detainees who become incarcerated.
 - Building new capacity in drug courts and jail reentry programs to appropriately include FDA-approved MAT tailored to the individual's clinical needs in crafting sentencing, diversion, and reentry requirements for persons with opioid addiction.
 - Assuring that approaches to MAT through drug courts and jails provide best practices and integrate closely with other county drug treatment priorities, programs, and practices.

SOR Projects

- 25 New or continuing projects
- Projects include:
 - Naloxone Distribution
 - MAT Access Points
 - Media Campaign
 - Special Populations
 - Tribal MAT Project



SOR Projects

- Naloxone Distribution
 - \$20 million committed to distributing Narcan Nasal Spray to emergency first responders, law enforcement, and other non-healthcare organizations
 - Manufacturer will be distributing directly to entities

- MAT Access Points
 - Provide grant funding for 200+ new access points to start-up or enhance MAT programs; including administration, slight infrastructure, physician recruitment, staffing, services and other needs.
 - Sites could be in primary care, hospitals, EDs, Medication Units, jails, colleges, residential treatment centers, tribal health centers, DUI providers, and community mental health centers.

- Media Campaign
 - Design a media campaign to access MAT treatment in CA.
 - Include a mechanism for individuals to connect to MAT treatment services.



SOR Projects

- **Special Populations**
 - Increase access to perinatal, veterans, service members (and families) seniors and youth (and families) services for MAT.
 - Project would include covering the cost of service provision for under- or uninsured senior patients.
 - Primary and secondary prevention activities would also be available with the funding including school programs.

- **Tribal MAT Project**
 - Expand MAT Champions Project (telehealth, naloxone, opioid coalitions) and Tele-MAT (academic detailing including tele-medicine support, webinars, consultation and TA).
